
Christy Tate's Level 3 Sculpture folio was selected to tour Aotearoa in the Top Art exhibition. Her work was based on the theme,































EIT Trades Academy and Careers







This free event is being held at the GGHS Hall, Gladstone Road, Gisborne, 24th March from 7pm till 8.30pm.



All the Year Nines are introduced to our Hinetu programme. Part of their learning is understanding the history of our kura. Ms Duff was our first principal from 1956 to 1973 and a distinctive aspect of her tenure was her flowing academic gown. It was described by the students as being "so familiar and permanent that the students were convinced she wore it to bed"! In 1970 Karen Johansen (an ex GGHS student) returned to work as a teacher at GGHS and Ms Duff mentioned to her that she would have "an illustrious teaching career." In 1973 Ms Duff retired and sadly three months later she passed away. A package then arrived at Karen's residence from a Hawke's Bay solicitor. It contained Ms Duff's academic gown. Karen later became principal of Gisborne Girls' from 1996 to 2008. Karen gifted the gown to our school and it is now exhibited in a glass case in the hallway entrance. He tino taonga tera korowai.
